Annie Laurie Gaylor to Speak at Joint American Atheists/ Minnesota Atheists Regional Conference in Minneapolis

The featured speaker originally scheduled for the American Atheists/Minnesota Atheists regional conference, Susan Jacoby, has had to withdraw due to an unexpected change of plans.

Annie Laurie Gaylor will be the featured speaker at the upcoming American Atheists/Minnesota Atheists regional conference in Minneapolis. Ms. Gaylor is the co-founder and co-president of the Freedom from Religion Foundation and a well-known activist.

The Freedom from Religion Foundation was founded by Ms. Gaylor, her mother Anne Nicol Gaylor, and John Sontarck in 1976. The Foundation works to promote separation of church and state and to expand understanding of nontheism.

The Freedom from Religion Foundation has won several significant court victories. Among these are FFRF v. Faith Works (2002), in which a Federal district judge ruled that Faith Works, a faith-based addiction program, could not receive public funds; FFRF v. HHS (2005), in which a Federal district court ruled that the Health and Human Services Department could not fund MentorKids, a social service agency that actively promoted religion; FFRF v. Rhea County Schools (2004), in which the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals upheld a district court ruling that it was unconstitutional for the school district to provide religious instruction; and FFRF v. U.S. Department of Education (2005) in which a settlement was reached prohibiting the Department of Education from distributing funds to Alaskan Christian College, an unaccredited Bible college.

Ms. Gaylor has also actively worked to promote feminism. In 1977, while still a college student, Ms. Gaylor helped organize the successful recall of Dane County, Wisconsin, Judge Archie Simonson for his repeated statements from the bench blaming rape on women's appearance. She is the past co-chair of the Feminist Caucus of the American Humanist As-

sociation and is currently a member of the Board of Directors of the Women's Medical Fund, one of the oldest abortion rights charities in the nation.

Ms. Gaylor has appeared on several national television talk shows, including Tom Snyder's *Tomorrow Show*, *The Sally Jessy Raphael Show*, and Phil Donahue's *Last Word*. She is the author of several books, including: *Betrayal of Trust: Clergy Abuse of Children* and *Woe to the Women—The Bible Tells Me So: The Bible, Female Sexuality & the Law*, and the editor of *Women without Superstition: "No Gods—No Masters."*

Recent Political Events Bittersweet for Atheists

When Rep. Juan Mendez' turn came up to provide the daily prayer to open a session of the Arizona House of Representatives, the professed humanist offered the following prayer-less invocation:

Most prayers in this room begin with a request to bow your heads. I would like to ask that you not bow your heads. I would like to ask that you take a moment to look around the room at all of the men and women here, in this moment, sharing this extraordinary experience of being alive and dedicating ourselves to working toward improving the lives of the people of our state.

This is a room in which there are many challenging debates, many moments of tension, of ideological division, of frustration. But this is also a room where, as my secular humanist traditions stress, by the very fact of being human, we have much more in common than we have differences. We share the same spectrum of potential for care, for compassion, for fear, for joy, for love.

Carl Sagan once wrote, "For small creatures such as we, the vastness is bearable only through love." There is, in the political process, much to bear. In this room, let us cherish and celebrate our shared humanness, our shared capacity for reason and compassion, our shared love for the people of our state, for our Constitution, and for our democracy—and let us root our policy-making process in

these values that are relevant to all Arizonans regardless of religious belief or non belief. In gratitude and in love, in reason and in compassion, let us work together for a better Arizona.

I quote Mendez' invocation in full to show that his sentiments should have united all the legislators, without exception. It is hard to find anything in this brief inspiration to which anyone could object. Nevertheless, his colleague Rep. Steve Smith lashed out at him angrily. The next day, after the usual prayer, Smith insisted on delivering a second one "for repentance of yesterday," asking colleagues to stand and "give our due respect to the creator of the universe."

Also in Arizona, the State Court of Appeals in June dismissed a suit in which a lower court had declared unconstitutional the annual Arizona Day of Prayer proclamations by Gov. Jan Brewer. The case was not lost on its merits, but on "standing." This is becoming the common result of most church-state violations for the last couple of years, both in federal and state courts. It used to be that simply being a taxpayer conveyed the standing to seek relief for Establishment Clause violations, but increasingly courts are requiring a claim of individual harm suffered by the plaintiff, and have been skeptical of these claims when they are presented. This has created a situation that is incompatible with constitutional government, in which judicial practice eliminates any recourse against governments that violate constitutional restrictions.

Recently, Rep. Jared Polis proposed an amendment to the National Defense Authorization bill to allow nontheistic chaplains. The amendment elicited bigoted and insulting comments such as this one by Rep. John Fleming:

This I think would make a mockery of the chaplaincy. The last thing in the world we would want to see was a young soldier who may be dying and they're at a field hospital and the chaplain is standing over that person saying to them, "If you die here, there is no hope for you in the future."

Of course there is no reason for anyone to expect that atheists would be insensitive at a time of grieving, and Fleming apparently does not think that the counseling needs of nonbelieving soldiers—needs that are filled for religious soldiers by the current chaplains—are worth considering. Ironically, Fleming had offered his own so-called "Religious Liberty Amendment" to this same bill, to remove all restraints on the proselytizing activities of evangelical Christian ministers.

I count it as a small sign of increasing political acceptance of nonbelievers that Polis' amendment was rejected by only 274-150.

WHEREAS, The Secular Coalition for Minnesota is being formed in Minneapolis at this time as a chapter of the Secular Coalition for America; and

Minnesota will soon be in contact with legislative, administrative and judicial branches of government as well as school districts, cities, counties and other governmental organizations where its governmental advocacy is needed to uphold such reason;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, R.T. RYBAK, Mayor of the City of Minneapolis, do hereby proclaim June 8, 2013 as:

DAY OF CELEBRATING REASON IN THE CITY OF MINNEAPOLIS and commend to all the people of Minneapolis the opportunity to join in this effort to uphold reason that represents sound judgment in reaching conclusions and inferences and in planning and implementing action and respect for non-theistic and other secular persons to participate along with other residents in civic life.

God and the Atom: Victor Stenger on *Atheists Talk* #220, May 26, 2013

Renowned particle physicist, professor, author, skeptic, and atheist activist Victor Stenger joined *Atheists Talk* to discuss his recently published book, *God and the Atom*.

Dr. Stenger has been popularizing the science of reality for decades. He has published dozens of articles for popular magazines and peer-reviewed journals and has written more than eleven books, seven in the past decade. He popularized the phrase, "Science flies you to the moon. Religion flies you into buildings."

In *God and the Atom* Dr. Stenger takes us on a historical journey of the concept of the atom, which starts much earlier than you might expect. Atomism—the theory that nature consists only of atoms and void—survived for centuries in the absence of direct evidence. Only recently, however, has technology been developed that definitively proves the atom's existence. Stenger makes the case that the total absence of empirical facts and theoretical arguments to support the existence of any component to reality other than atoms and the void can be taken as proof beyond a reasonable doubt that such a component is nowhere to be found.

American Atheists: David Silverman on *Atheists Talk* #221, June 2, 2013

Love him or hate him, if you're an atheist in America, you probably have an opinion about David Silverman, president of American Atheists. Whether he's inspiring Bill O'Reilly to say incomprehensible things about science or putting up billboards that disturb almost as many atheists as Christians, Silverman demands our attention.

August Berkshire's Atheist Pamphlets: August Berkshire on *Atheists Talk* #222, June 9th, 2013

August Berkshire has been an atheist speaker, debater, and activist since he co-founded the modern atheist movement in Minnesota in 1984. He is a past president and newsletter editor of Minnesota Atheists and a past vice president of Atheist Alliance International. He has served on the board of directors of the Humanists of Minnesota and co-founded Camp Quest of Minnesota in 2003. He is on the speakers bureau for the national Secular Student Alliance.

August has developed a series of pamphlets that are distributed at schools, festivals, and other venues. The pamphlets cover a variety of topics, including atheism, religion, the problem of evil, abortion, the fine-tuned universe, Jesus, Biblical commandments, and humor. Skeptics Society founder Michael Shermer said August's performance in a debate in Fargo was "the best overall defense of atheism that I have ever seen."

Skepticism 101: Michael Shermer on *Atheists Talk* #224, June 23, 2013

Dr. Michael Shermer is the founding publisher of *Skeptic* magazine, the Executive Director of the Skeptics Society, a monthly columnist for *Scientific American*, the host of the Skeptics Distinguished Science Lecture Series at Caltech, and Adjunct Professor at Claremont Graduate University and Chapman University.

Dr. Shermer lectures frequently and appears regularly on radio and television. He is the author of seventeen books, including *Why People Believe Weird Things*, *The Science of Good and Evil*, and his most recent book, *The Believing Brain*.

On this show Dr. Shermer discusses his course "Skepticism 101: How to Think Like a Scientist." This course is part of The Great Courses series, an online educational resource with the mission "to ignite the passion for lifelong learning by offering great courses taught by great professors." With "Skepticism 101," Dr. Shermer seeks to help students use rational thought and scientific perspective to critically evaluate claims and to better understand the universe.
